**Support the
MTSD recall**

To the editor:
Why the recall? It all circles back to academic achievement!

When looking at MTSD's own data disclosed in August, mathematics achievement from 3rd through 8th grade showed only 56% of students meeting that benchmark. More alarming, "7th grade had the lowest percentage of students who met Milestone 3 at 47%," showed MTSD math data. That's a 19.3% decrease from 2018 to 2021.

Early reading scores also showed an alarming decline. In 2015-16, 95% of students met or exceeded Milestone 1, Reading to Independent Level. That percentage consistently declined to 81% in 2020-21. In 2019-20, "the Kindergarten scores were the lowest at 76% of students" reading at grade level, the report stated. Further, "in 2020-21, the same cohort was the lowest achieving at 73% as first graders."

Recall supporters have been communicating with the board about these academic issues for months prior to no avail. Academic achievement was not discussed until August — a month before school started. The pandemic cannot be to blame for all this.

Data clearly goes back to 2015-16. Why has academic decline happened? Is it curriculum choices? Is it instructional strategies? Is it student-teacher ratios, 1:25 respectively, in the elementary/middle schools?

Recall supporters advocate for our MTSD teachers. Teachers are essential. Teachers are equally as important as parents with children's education. Recall supporters want more funding for teacher support in classrooms versus the district spending more money on upper-level administrators that don't have a direct effect on student achievement. Parents are concerned that standards are actually being lowered in core subject areas. Students struggle to pass ACTs and college math placements; even though they achieve A's and high B's in their classes. Do parents not have the right to question those overseeing the district and setting policies?

Support the teachers and students. Support the recall. Restore MTSD.

**Check things out
for yourself before

Is the School Board recall really about taxes going up by 21%, a 22% decline in student enrollment, 15% decline in reading skills, 15% decline in math and ACT? Well, it only takes a few minutes of your time to check for yourself. These are all falsehoods (lies). The recall is not about the School Board, but rather it is a start of a bigger plan by a small fanatical group of people who don't plan to stop at the School Board but will try to do the same to our city and state government.

I have checked it out myself in as little as 10 minutes by going to such sources of information as government websites like <https://dpi.wi.gov/sfs/statistical/basic-facts/district-tax-levy-rates>. The truth is that our taxes are among the lowest compared to most of the schools in our district. Our mill rate (tax paid per \$1000 of assessed property value) has gone down year after year since 2015; from \$2.22 per \$1000 in 2015, to \$1.68 in 2020 and a bit higher in 2021 of 7.96 (which is due to the referendum to pay for key projects to improve our schools in order to compete with the rest of the world). My property taxes have remained low and in the last five years have actually gone down.

My kids graduated from MTSD schools and are well prepared for college and their future. Please take time to check the facts yourself from reputable sources before you blindly trust people coming in from outside who just want to push their fanatical agenda on us all. Check out the facts before you act. Vote for truth over lies.
